CloudLibrary Has So Much to Offer!

If you haven’t heard yet, BCLS has switched from Boundless to the CloudLibrary platform for eBooks and eAudiobooks on December 18th. If you haven’t already, you will need to go to your app store and download the free CloudLibrary app to continue to checkout BCLS eBooks and eAudiobooks.

If you are worried about learning to navigate a new app, don’t be. While the CloudLibrary app is a little different from the old Bound-

less app, patrons that have made the switch and have been using the CloudLibrary app have not experienced any problems with either downloading, installing, or navigating the app.

Good news! CloudLibrary has an added bonus: With the CloudLibrary app and your BCLS library card our patrons may checkout eBooks and eAudiobooks not only our collection but also from other public libraries within Mississippi

that also subscribe to CloudLibrary. Currently, there are six libraries in Mississippi (including us) using CloudLibrary with a combined total of over 14,000 eBooks and eAudiobooks available for checkout.

This sharing of resources among CloudLibrary subscribers is called CloudLink. Be aware there are some limitations to CloudLink. First, while all BCLS-owned

eBooks and eAudiobooks will show up in the CloudLibrary app whether they are checked out or not, you will only see items from other libraries that are not checked out; they will only show up within the app if they are currently available for checkout. And second, while you can place reserves and save BCLS eBooks and eAudiobooks to your “Wish List,” you cannot do either of these actions with items from other Mississippi libraries.

As before, in order to comply with recently enacted Mississippi

Code, §39-3-25, as of July 1, 2023, eBooks and eAudiobooks on both CloudLibrary and hoopla is only available for checkout to adults 18-years and older. However, as with the Boundless app, parents have the ability to share content with their own children within the CloudLibrary app.

All you need to access eBooks and eAudiobooks is to have a BCLS library card (the barcode on the back of your library card that you enter without spaces) and your personal PIN to access CloudLibrary. Go to our website for

more info at <bolivar.lib.ms.us>.

If you don't have a library card, stop by one of our branches to get one. You must be a Bolivar County resident or work in Bolivar County to get your free library card, or you may pay the out-of-county fee of \$25 per year. Need a PIN (or can't remember your PIN)? Call us to get one.

Did You Know?

You can request that BCLS purchase an item you are interested in reading (either print, eBook, or eAudiobook) and/or viewing (DVDs)? Yes, if we don't have a title in the format you desire, we will consider purchasing the item to add to our collections. We cannot guarantee we will purchase a particular item, but whether it is a book in print, large print, or digital format, or a movie, TV series, or documentary

on DVD, we will evaluate the item for purchase. If we do not choose to purchase a particular item, if it is a print or large print book, we will attempt to borrow the item through our Inter-Library Loan (ILL) system. Please be aware that we cannot ILL books that are newer than 6—9 months, digital books, or DVDs.

We have a free notary public?
Yes, we have a notary public that notarizes documents free-of

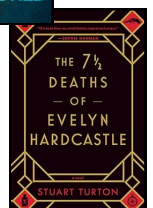
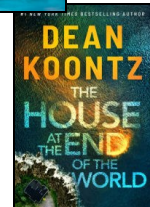
Looking for a Good Book?

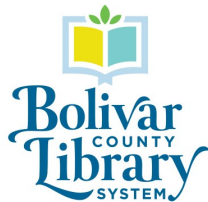
Martha: *The Unseen* by Kat Martin. Rachel, who's battling Muscular Dystrophy, lives in her family's 19th century mansion Belle Reve with her caregiver and niece Nicole. After a 100 year-old skeleton is unearthed on the grounds, strange things begin to happen—strange things of the supernatural variety. When Nicole meets Lucas, she is instantly attracted to him, but he is the owner of the youth detention facility where her half-brother is incarcerated. Despite this, the attraction is mutual, and Lucas soon finds himself embroiled in the frightening events happening at Belle Reve. As Rachel's health deteriorates, Nicole and Lucas must work together to unravel the mystery of Belle Reve and save Rachel's life. Another great book! If you like Romantic Thrillers with some supernatural thrown in, you will like this. (Fiction—eBook)

Tamara: *The House at the End of the World* by Dean Koontz. Katie lives alone on her own small, private island called Jacob's Ladder in self-exile following a traumatic experience. Eschewing all outside contact, she has no TV, radio, or internet and her groceries are delivered, which is just the way Katie wants it. The secret government research facility next door has posed no problems. That is, until the unexpected arrival of "guests" that are looking for someone—or something—from the facility. As you can predict, things go downhill from there—FAST! Stranded with a severe storm moving in, Katie must fend for herself against both an unseen enemy and the weather. When a young girl suddenly appears, she and Katie must work together to survive. This suspenseful page-turner is recommended for those who love fast-moving thrillers. (Fiction—Print & Audiobook on CD)

Tamara: *The 7 1/2 Deaths of Evelyn Hardcastle* by Stuart Turton. When the narrator "becomes aware," he's soaking wet in the middle of a forest—and has no memory of who he is. When he stumbles into a clearing, he finds an abandoned mansion. But, no, it's not abandoned, just in a high state of disrepair. Inside he meets people who know him, but he has no memory of them. When a woman is murdered that night, he's shocked and bewildered. Then, he wakes up the next day in someone else's body, someone he met the day before at the house—and, it's yesterday again! This is one trippy, twisty, supernatural murder mystery with a sense of dread that keeps building as the story continues. I loved the concept and the mystery kept me in suspense and guessing. (Fiction—Large Print & eBook)

Some Bolivar County History...

"Rosedale by Florence Sillers Ogden" - Continued

"Schools

The first seat of learning was an old frame store in the business part of town, belonging to Mr. John Kuhn, located where the Southern Oil Company now stands. The teacher was Miss Hannah Venable of Memphis. Among the "scholars" were Miss Lottie Montgomery, Frank Scott, Edwin and Rucks Yerger, and others.

Colonel F. A. Montgomery made every effort to improve the means of education. His first move was to donate for school purposes a small office building, located in the southeast corner of his yard, just under the limbs of the old cottonwood tree which stands there now. Those who taught there were, successively, Mr. J. M. Waters, the Methodist minister, Mrs. J. B. Brander, Miss Ida Gayden of Beulah, and Mr. Prosser, the Episcopal minister.

After the small Methodist church was built, in the late seventies [1870s], it was used as a schoolhouse during the week. It was customary in those days for the minister to serve as teacher and preacher; and the young Methodist minister, Mr. Waters, taught the children during the week in the church and preached in it on Sundays. When the new church was erected the old one was taken over by the school. For years there was only one room and one teacher. Either Miss Tillie Montgomery or Miss Hattie Chambers served as teacher over a long period. Then another room was added, and a man employed as principal. The first principal was Professor John Martin.

In 1902 the children published the following petition to the town council:

We, the children of the Rosedale School, ask the people of Rosedale to help us build a new schoolhouse. We have fifty-nine children in the school. We have to sit three on a seat, and some of us on the floor. Every time it rains, it leaks on the recitation bench, so we have to stand up, and the soot blows on the little girls aprons. We are going to give a dollar each. Won't you please help?

This petition was signed by the following pupils: Pattie Bryant, Fontaine Jones, Florence Sillers, Richard Nugent, Katie May Yerger, Postelle Chaney, Dulaney Clark, Eugene Chaney, Vera Joest, Lillian Lobdell, Genevieve Stone, Lottie Kirchner, May Pearl Scott, Leslie Joest, Ethel Bryant, Finley Linnell, Hugh Sutherland, Zoe Roberts, Alex Yerger, Georgia Scott, John Lobdell, Jim and Charlie Caldwell, Richard Shelby, Dot Washington, Ward Gary, Lena C. Roberts, Mary Lapresto, Sheffy McBroom, Eva Joest, Vernon Barrett, Edna Linnell, Louise Lapresto, Virginia Hines, and Bertha Kimbal. There were others who signed, but their names are not available."
