

Stephen Smith Talks about McCartys Pottery

Stephen Smith was guest speaker for the February 9th Luncheon With Books program that featured the new book McCarty's of Merigold, Mississippi: The Pottery written by Greenville native and author John Ramsey Miller.

Mr. Smith shared his memories of growing up in Merigold and of "Uncle" Lee and "Aunt" Pup McCarty, who

founded McCartys Pottery in Merigold in 1954. Mr. Smith and his brother are godsons of the McCartys and Lee helped raise them. The Smith boys were raised by Margaret and Albert Smith, who helped raise their nephew Lee. After earning his law degree at the University of Georgia in 1991, Mr. Smith worked for a law firm in Athens, Georgia for the next seven years.

Home called, however, and Mr. Smith and his brother returned to Merigold in 1998 to join the family business, with Stephen managing the studio's business affairs and the Gallery Restaurant.



Max, also investigating the murder, teams up with Charlotte to find out just what is going on. The story twists and turns to the surprise ending. Another one I greatly enjoyed by Ms. Krentz. (Fiction—Print)

Shelby: Finding Zoe by Brandi Rarus and Gail Harris. Described as "a deaf woman's story of identity, love, and adoption," Brandi Rarus' memoir really makes you think about how different things are for deaf people, not something one usually ponders because they can blend in really well. It give you a different perspective. Good book. (Non-fiction—Print)

Tamara: The Lies that Bind: a Bibliophile Mystery by Kate Carlisle. Our favorite book restoration specialist Brooklyn Wainwright is teaching a bookbinding class at a famous museum in San Francisco. "WAR: As Affecting Bolivar County and its Citizens, 1861-1862

Some Bolivar County History...

[Continuation from last month's newsletter]

After months of drilling, the Bolivar Troop was ordered to war, and our little company accompanied them to the river landing, where they embarked. The families of all the Troopers, and the citizens generally, gathered to see them off. The sweetheart of one of the Troopers that the writer knew well stood out alone on the bank of the river while her lover waved the flag of the company until the boat bearing the Troopers north disappeared around the bend of the river. She never saw him again."
