Director's Corner-NEA Big Read Grant

We are excited to partner with Delta State University and other community organizations in the upcoming National Endowment for the Arts Big Read project (NEA Big Read). Sixty-two non-profit organizations nationwide were awarded this grant and Delta State University is the only organization in Mississippi to be a recipient.

Upcoming programming will be centered around Homegoing by Yaa Gyasi. The project will span December 2022 until completion in March 2023. Free copies of *Homegoing* will be available for students, faculty and staff at Delta State University and all branches of the Bolivar County Library System beginning December 1, 2022. During this project, there will be five book discussions, a panel discussion, film screening and lecture, and a presentation regarding Black culinary history by Adrian Miller. Also included will be a special musical performance and writing workshop for area high school students. Personally, I am excited to be able to offer our patrons all the wonderful upcoming programming. This project should include something of interest for everyone in our community.

Summary for *Homegoing* (2016) states the book is about "two half sisters, Effia and Esi, unknown to each other, are born into two different tribal villages in 18th century Ghana. Effia will be married off to an English colonial, and will live in comfort in the sprawling, palatial rooms of Cape Coast Castle, raising half-caste children who will be sent abroad to be educated in England before returning to the Gold Coast to serve as administrators of the

Empire. Her sister, Esi, will be imprisoned beneath Effia in the Castle's women's dungeon, and then shipped off on a boat bound for America, where she will be sold into slavery. Stretching from the tribal wars of Ghana to slavery and Civil War in America, from the coal mines in the north to the Great Migration to the streets of 20th century Harlem, Yaa Gyasi's has written a modern masterpiece, a novel that moves through histories and geographies and -with outstanding economy and force--captures the troubled spirit of our own nation."

Currently, there is one copy of Homecoming available at Robinson-Carpenter Memorial Library in Cleveland for checkout. Additionally, there is also an eBook version available in AXIS360 for circulation.


On June 21st, Wanda Woodard from MDOT, along with Myrtle the Turtle, talked about littering and its effect on the environment.

Looking for a Good Book?

Anna: The Candy House: A Novel by Jennifer Egan. This book reads more like a compilation of thematically-linked short stories than a true novel. Nonetheless, it is an ambitious, engaging work by Egan, who truly shows her creative chops with this book. With the advent of Own Your Unconscious, a new technology that allows humans to externalize, share, and relive all their memories, characters must learn to adapt to a rapidly changing world. A world in which one's entire personal experience can be commodified. Thought provoking!! (Fiction— Print & Audiobook on CD)

Martha: Out of the Clear Blue Sky by Kristin Higgins. With her son off to college, Lillie expected her life to change, but not this drastically! When her husband dumps her "out of the clear blue sky," she goes a little crazy... This book started off slow, but it's so worth sticking with. It was an excellent book that I thoroughly enjoyed. As usual, with a Kristin Higgins book you can expect some humor and a heartwarming story. (Fiction—Print)

Anna: Left on Tenth: A Second Chance at Life by Delia Ephron. I was genuinely laughing out loud while reading this book. This is a hilarious satire about academia, race, and relationships. When burned-out Ph.D. candidate Ingrid uncovers disturbing information about the poet whose work she's analyzing for her dissertation, all hell breaks loose, and she is forced to reconsider and question many aspects of her life. Absurd, funny, brilliant. (Biography—Print)

Tamara: Biloxi: A Novel by Mississippian Mary Miller. The story is about a sixty-year-old man who is not dealing well with his recent divorce, his self-imposed estrangement with his daughter, or his recent retirement. He's lonely, unhappy, set in his ways, not always very charitable toward others, and he's drinking way too much, but realizes he needs to change. He starts by taking in an unwanted dog he names Layla... Funny, sad, and hopeful, I really enjoyed this book.

Tamara: The Supernaturals by RITA Award nominee David L. Goleman. The first book in the Supernaturals series, this introduces the reader to the top-rated TV show Hunters of the Paranormal, which "investigate" haunted houses and is not above "salting the mine" to achieve the thrills needed to keep their show on top. Now, they plan to investigate the so-called Summer Place that has been the site of several unexplained deaths and disappearances and air live a Halloween special from the house. But they may get more than they bargained for-a lot more! I loved this and can't wait to read the second book in the series. (Fiction-eBook)

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Some Bolivar County History...

"Rosedale by Florence Sillers Ogden

The last line from the previous excerpt: "The landing was spoken of as "Lower Rosedale" and was not a part of the original plantation."

"According to the original entry book, the place where Rosedale now rests changed hands many times, chiefly through tax sales. The land is listed as follows: "This land was patented October 9, 1835, to J. A. Girault, by U. S. A.; November 16, 1856, to John J. Craig; November 13, 1865, to Elisha Warfield; December 3, 1869, to J. H. Field, who sold it to H. T. Florey."

In 1872 the Radical and Carpetbagger leaders surreptitiously obtained an act of the legislature removing the country seat from Beulah, and on May 22, the Board of Police met in the plantation home of J. H. Field in Lower Rosedale and negotiated for this two-story residence for a courthouse. They paid Mr. Field \$10,000 for his frame dwelling and \$4,000 for a wooden stable, which was renovated and used for a jail². They removed the county records that night from Beulah, under cover of darkness, to the new county seat, which they named Floreyville, in honor of Florey, the leading Radical of the county. During this period Bolivar County was entirely at the mercy of the Radicals, who placed Negroes in all offices they did not fill themselves.

Some of those who composed the settlement of Floreyville were: H. T. Florey, L. Webber, J. H. Field, Sally Field, Eldon Field, Joe Ousley (a Negro), James Joor, B. K. Bruce, sheriff (a Negro), C. M. Bowles, M. B. Sullivan, Charles Scott, Dr. Reeves, Dr. Peeples, Judge Ben Trimble, Dr. McGowan, Mrs. Carpenter, Will Carpenter, Colonel Alex Yerger, Mrs. Mary Thomas and children, Bessie and Oscar Thomas, O. G. McGuire, Mrs. M. A. Purnell, Mrs. Josephine Preston, Mrs. Slawson and family, Charlie McGuire, W. P. Jones and family, Captain Noel, Mr. Leftwich, John Reinhart, J. J. Jennings, E. Gardner, and others."

²Costs were low at this period and this price was exorbitant—political pie.
